introduce you to my son Nate (right). Nate came home to when us he was 12 years old. He was born in China in an extremely poor, disadvanta ged area. Nate, who

is Deaf, has poor vision (though you would never know by the way he has learned to compensate for it!) He suffered from a Brachial Plexus Injury (BPI) at birth, which has left his right arm severely deformed and mostly unable to use. And yet, Nate stays cheerful and positive. He is an overcomer!

It was at **Deaf Camp**, six years ago, when Nate discovered other Deaf people existed. He had only been home three weeks and had not met any other deaf people. When he arrived at camp, he did not realize there were other Deaf people like him. He was astounded to find other people using the same signs we were using, and these signs meant something. They were not just gestures. He could communicate with far more than just his family he could communicate with all the people at camp! This was an amazing discovery for him!

In previous years Nate watched the Archery



activity because with his arm, he did not have a way to pull the bow back. Once we realized this issue, my husband **Chris** and Nate went to work watching You-Tube videos. They devised a way with a tiny tab that Nate could clench between his teeth, then meticulously place the arrow, with one hand, into the notch, while resting the bow on his shoulder, he slightly tilts to the side so the arrow does not fall off. Slowly, gingerly, he finds his target, pulls back the string, and lets it soar. The first several times doing this, the arrow would fall

off the bow. He had to patiently try over and over to get this technique It down. was painfully tedious to watch. But he determined was and persistent. He was finally able to make the arrow glide through the air. He was finally able to participate in the archery tag



with his friends, family, and mentors.

Nate was able to kayak independently for the first time as well. This we had not planned or thought much about, as he is usually eager to swim with friends during the recreation period at camp. However, this year, he decided to kayak. This may not seem like a big deal initially. However, for a one-handed person to paddle and maneuver the kayak is quite challenging. Again, Nate tackled it like a champion.

He conquered these new activities (and many others!) at **Deaf & Family & Friends Camp**. Nate was able to feel comfortable, with his Deaf friends and mentors cheering him on. They accepted and encouraged him in his own language. It was at Deaf Camp he forged friendships and gained Deaf Role models. These role models are crucial for deaf kids. They can teach things, we Hearing parents cannot. He has a special comradery with these Deaf Mentors and friends.

For me, **Deaf Streetlight** has ministered to our family in far greater ways than we can put into



words. This is a place our hearing cousins, aunts and uncles can come to gain ASL skills. This is a place our extended family can be immersed in the Deaf Community. This is a place where we all are connected and experience life together. Deaf Streetlight's Family and Friends Camp has played a vital role for our family, bringing both Deaf and Hearing alike, together to have fun, learn, grow, and accept new challenged head on. I am thankful and indebted to Deaf & Family & Friends Camp and Deaf Streetlight for making this possible for our family. We have received grace upon grace.
